## Living well with dementia

Thurrock Council's Dementia Action Plan 2013 - 14

The previous action plan (2011 – 2013) was evaluated and all objectives achieved or no longer relevant were removed The revised action plan has been streamlined for the coming year hopefully resulting in a focussed document.

17 objectives were identified in the National Dementia Strategy. Objectives 1 to 12 specify improvements in 3 key areas;

- raising awareness and understanding,
- early diagnosis and support
- living well with dementia.

The remaining 5 objectives are cross cutting objectives which enable change to be implemented which include workforce development, commissioning, performance monitoring and evaluation, and research. In addition there is a commitment to ensuring both national and regional support for the implementation of the strategy. At a later date an objective for the reduction of inappropriate use of anti-psychotic medication was accepted.

As such it is these main areas from the National Dementia Strategy and the priorities in the Essex, Southend and Thurrock Dementia Strategy that shape this action plan.
