Executive Summary

Cabinet Report 4 September 2013 approved the placing of contracts and agreed "that delegated authority to the Director of Planning & Transportation, in consultation with the Portfolio Holder to seek tenders to replace the existing Henderson and Taylor contract for reactive maintenance work and the Eurovia contract for major resurfacing, and award the subsequent contracts after the completion of a competitive process in accordance with the Council's contracting procedures".

The process for preparing and tendering contracts is underway. A waiver to extend the original Henderson and Taylor contract for maintenance will expire on 31 May 2014. It is proposed that another waiver be approved to allow a further 7 months contract extension from 1 June to 31 December 2014. This will allow maintenance work to continue whilst the new contract is developed.

1. Recommendation

1.1 That the Director for Planning & Transportation be delegated the authority to make a new waiver for a contract extension for the highways maintenance contract.

2. Introduction and Background

- 2.1 Cabinet Report 4 September 2013 approved the placing of contracts and agreed "that delegated authority to the Director of Planning & Transportation, in consultation with the Portfolio Holder to seek tenders to replace the existing Henderson and Taylor contract for reactive maintenance work and the Eurovia contract for major resurfacing, and award the subsequent contracts after the completion of a competitive process in accordance with the Council's contracting procedures".
- 2.2 The process for preparing and tendering contracts is underway. A waiver to extend the original Henderson & Taylor contract for maintenance will expire on 31 May 2014. It is proposed that another waiver be approved to allow a further 7 months contract extension from 1 June to 31 December 2014. This will allow highway maintenance work to continue whilst the new contract is developed.
- 2.3 The original waiver expires on 31 May 2014 and has expended £1.1m. This 7 month extension is for £750k which gives a total contract extension estimated at £1.85m.

4. Reasons for Recommendation

- 4.1 The contract extension is necessary to continue to provide highway maintenance work whilst the new tendering process is carried out. This work is required to maintain the safe and convenient highway service.
- 4.2 It is also required to deliver those parts of the 2014/15 highways capital programme which require surfacing.

the maintenance, schemes and programmes which require the work and will be managed on that basis.

7.2 Legal

The new tendering process is being carried out in accordance with the Council's contract procedure rules requirements.

The rules require a waiver in those cases where a contract needs to be extended, as this is essentially a new contract award without benefit of a competitive tendering process. In addition, in this instance, the award is to a specific contractor, and therefore constitutes a single source tender. The authority given by the decision requested here will allow an extension of the current interim contract, which complies with the Council's contract procedure rules.

The maintenance work contributes to the delivery of the Highways service.

The value of the highway service is shown by an Equality Impact Assessment which has been carried for the 2014/15 Highways & Transport Capital Programme. It recognises the transport interventions that will support improved quality of life in the Borough and its social and economic regeneration as well as transport priorities for, congestion & CO2 mitigation, accessibility, safety, air quality and climate change adaptation.

Access to services and the safety of residents have been highlighted and will be addressed throughout the plan period. The evidence base for the Thurrock Transport Strategy and Implementation Plan identify specific areas of the borough and population where implementation will be prioritised to improve road safety, air quality and access to services, taking account of legislative considerations such as the Equality Act. These have been applied to the capital programme.
