This Council believes planning works best when developers and the local community work together to shape local areas and deliver necessary new homes; and, therefore, the Council resolves to write to our local members of parliament asking them to protect the right of communities to object to individual planning applications in the forthcoming legislation.	The Council recognises the important role local communities and residents play in the planning system and would not want to see this undermined. The Council will work with MHCLG on any future changes to the planning system and to ensure that our communities continue to have their say in the shape of new developments in Thurrock. The Planning for the Future white paper published in August 2020 set out the Government's proposals for "once in a generation" reform of England's planning system.
