## **Executive Summary**

This report was originally commissioned at the summer term 2014 meeting of SACRE in response to concerns raised by a report from the All Party Parliamentary Group on RE with the support of the RE Council of England and Wales that suggested that RE in primary schools was increasingly being delivered by adults other than teachers.

At the time of writing, almost 30% of primary schools in Thurrock had responded to a request for information about provision for RE and of those, no school reported that their entire RE provision was being delivered by adults other than teachers but almost 50% of those that responded did report that some lessons of RE were delivered by teaching assistants. SACRE resolved to continue to seek responses to this survey in order to collect a more representative sample of data.

By June 2015, 65% of Thurrock schools had responded. 25% of those reported using teaching assistants at all but none used Teaching Assistants or Higher Level Teaching Assistants for all their classes.

- 1. Recommendation(s) that SACRE:
- 1.1 That SACRE Discuss the potential impact of using adults other than teachers to deliver RE on the quality of provision and consider their response to schools in relation to this matter.

# 2. Introduction and Background

2.1 Thurrock SACRE discussed the report, "RE: The Truth Unmasked" during its meetings in 2014 and launched an enquiry into the delivery of RE in Thurrock Primary schools in an attempt to discover whether or not the issues identified in this report were also the case in Thurrock. According to the report, almost one in four primary pupils were taught RE by teaching assistants.

## 3. Issues, Options and Analysis of Options

- 3.1 It is difficult to draw conclusions when only 30% of the data has been returned but early indications are positive. SACRE might opt to continue to encourage schools to respond to the request for information or decide to act on this sample of data.
- 3.2 The risk of writing to schools with incomplete data is that the conclusions might lack credibility in the minds of those who we wish to influence. However, the challenge of increasing the response-rate must not be under-estimated due to demands on the time of Headteachers.
